Much of the technical work on the emerging AUNT-SUE 'tool-kit' relies on the commitment and dedication of some younger team-members, who have just started to establish themselves in the research community. We would like to introduce them to you.

Pete Davis (LU) MEng is a Research Associate in the Department of Design and Technology at LU. He has joined us in 2007 to work on the HADRIAN/Journey Planner. Pete recently completed an MEng in Product Design and Manufacture. He chose transport accessibility as the topic of his individual project, for which he studied psychological stress and developed a journey planner concept. Young Practitioner Network

Our consortium is intending to set up a section of the AUNT-SUE network for students and young practitioners across different disciplines/professions.

The idea came about from discussions with senior staff in the research and higher education departments of professional bodies, including:

- The Chartered Institute of Logistic & Transport
- The Chartered Institute of Architectural Technologists

All agreed in that inclusivity and accessibility in transport, together with the related public realm, are of growing importance, and that it will need new approaches and attitudes to deliver the necessary improvements. We would like to support the professional bodies by targeting young professionals as well as students and involving them in case studies/ projects.
